In 2010 he was runner up for the Tasmanian – Australian of the Year Award for his work supporting governance outcomes in Tasmanian Aboriginal community organisations and he has been a long standing supporter and participant of the Tasmanian Leaders Program and its affiliated activities. Alan is also an emerging artist and has exhibited in North and North West of Tasmania

and works extensively with his community and also in the field of disability services. He is currently the NEIS Consultant, assisting individuals to create micro businesses through North, North West and West Coast of Tasmania. Through Speedfox Consultancy he is currently facilitating the training of ten sole traders in the Diploma of Leadership and Management.

Parker J. Palmer

Parker, founder and Senior Partner Emeritus of the Center for Courage & Renewal, is a world-renowned writer, speaker, and activist who focuses on issues in education, community, leadership, spirituality and social change.



His new project is *The Growing Edge*, with singer-songwriter Carrie Newcomer. He holds a Ph.D. in sociology from the University of California at Berkeley, as well as thirteen honorary doctorates. He is the author of ten books, including several award-winning titles, that have sold nearly two million copies and been translated into twelve languages.

In 1998, the Leadership Project, a national survey of 10,000 educators, named him one of the thirty 'most influential senior leaders' in higher education and one of the ten key 'agenda-setters' of the past decade. Since 2002, the Accrediting Commission for Graduate Medical Education has given annually Parker J. Palmer Courage to Teach and Courage to Lead awards to directors of exemplary medical residency programs. In 2010, Palmer received the William Rainey Harper Award whose previous recipients included Margaret Mead, Elie Wiesel, Marshall McLuhan, and Paolo Freire.

Rosalie Martin

Rosalie is a clinical speech pathologist with 35 years of experience, around twenty of them at the helm of her Hobart-based practice, Speech Pathology Tasmania.



She is also a criminologist and accredited facilitator with the Centre of Courage and Renewal. Kindness in action, kindness in communication and evidence-based service delivery are critical drivers of her work. In 2013 Rosalie founded the charity Chatter Matters, now Connect42, which brought literacy and parent-child attachment programs to inmates of Tasmania's Risdon Prison. For this work, she was awarded 2017 Tasmanian Australian of the Year. Rosalie and Connect42 continue to develop and deliver programs of relationship and literacy, through care and job pathways for those within the prison system, and those re-entering the community. Always busy and a true believer in fun, Rosalie is surrounded by colleagues, friends and family for whom she is ever grateful.

Polly is an author, speaker, broadcaster, leadership facilitator and designer and all-purpose human being.



With over a decade working in innovation and commercialisation in leadership program design and delivery for public, university and private sector roles, Polly has a strong background in combining entrepreneurial coaching, facilitating, teaching, curriculum design and content authoring with the search for meaning and purpose. One of only 400 people selected globally to be trained

Erik Hans Klijn

Professor Dr. Erik Hans Klijn is an international distinguished Public Administration scholar especially in the field of complex decision making, policy networks and network management.



For the last ten years his research has expanded to branding and media influence on complex decision making. In 2019 he received an honorary doctorate from the University of Gent for his work on network governance. His research and teaching the last ten years especially focused on topics like: the impact of network management on network performance; the role of trust in complex decision making in networks; democratic legitimacy in

complex decision making; research on public and private partnerships; the influence of media attention on complex decision making in networks and styles of street level bureaucrats. In 2012 Klijn wrote a book on branding in public management and governance with Jasper Eshuis elaborating this theme for the public administration discipline. Research (experiment design) also shows that public brands have impact on the trust people have in policy and they showed that stakeholder influence is important for brand effectiveness.

Kate Griffiths

Kate is the Budget Policy and Institutional Reform Fellow, Grattan Institute.



She is a scientist and policy analyst, with experience in government, strategy consulting, and academic research. Kate has co-authored Grattan reports on budgets and tax, lobbying and political donations, female workforce participation, intergenerational inequality, energy, education and health policy. Before Grattan, Kate worked for The Boston Consulting Group with clients in the energy and health sectors, and in science and research policy for the Australian Government. Kate holds a Masters in Science from the University of Oxford and an Honours degree in Science from the Australian National University.

Steve Curnin

Steve is Director of the Disaster Resilience Research Group and Senior Lecturer in Organisational Resilience at the University of Tasmania.

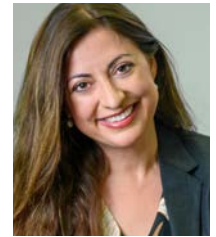


His research seeks to improve human capabilities in high reliability working environments. Steve collaborates with organisations from the public, private and not-for-profit sectors to produce tangible outputs that can be used to enhance organisational resilience. Research that Steve conducted with

emergency management practitioners from the public and not-for-profit sectors involved in the 2016 Tasmanian Floods, identified that 'swift trust' facilitated collaborative relationships. Working with the Tasmanian State Government, this research developed a guidance document explaining how to foster collaborative relationships in emergency management recovery operations.

Joanna Giannes

Joanna is a leadership development specialist with more than two decades of leadership practice and research.



She has a background in psychotherapy with post graduate qualifications in organisational Learning and a Masters degree in Education (Leadership and Management). Her work has taken her across Australia and overseas where she has supported numerous organisations in culture change, led award winning community leadership programs, co-designed and created Aboriginal and cross-cultural women's civic leadership programs through to integrating social enterprise education in addressing social issues. Joanna builds capacity in individuals and communities by drawing from multiple disciplines such as anthropology, cross cultural practices, transpersonal psychology and contemporary leadership theories. Raised in the oral tradition, Joanna draws from her Hellenic ancestry of mythology archetypes, elements and ancient healing ways to support people and communities to move towards wholeness.

Leon Compton

Leon Compton joined ABC Radio Hobart in 2011 as the presenter on Statewide Mornings covering local current affairs and events.



He has previously worked with ABC Radio in the Northern Territory, Victoria and NSW. Leon began his career at the ABC in 2001

as a Breakfast presenter on ABC Western Victoria after a two year stint in commercial radio in Deniliquin. His first day at the ABC was marked by comprehensively bogging the work car in Lake Hindmarsh.

Shane Fitzsimmons

Commissioner Shane Fitzsimmons joined Resilience NSW following more than thirty years of experience with the NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) serving as both a volunteer and salaried officer.



He is a member of the NSW State Emergency Management Committee, the NSW State Rescue Board and a Councillor of the Royal Humane Society of NSW Inc. He was awarded the National Medal in 1999 and Australian Fire Service Medal (AFSM) in 2001.

Adie Delaney

Adie creates work in the intersection of her three roles; directing a community circus program, teaching consent with a sexual harm prevention perspective, and as a multidisciplinary artist.



She has travelled the world since 2006 performing as a circus artist. She has been based in Tasmania since 2015 when she founded The Circus Studio. Adie still pops up on stage as an aerialist, storyteller, actor and more and is also a primary prevention educator at the Sexual Assault Support Service. Adie identifies as a 'multipotentialite' and has not ruled out any possibilities of what she might do when she grows up.

Dean Parkin

Dean is from the Quandamooka peoples of North Stradbroke Island in Queensland.



He is Director of From the Heart, a campaign for an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice to Parliament protected by the constitution, as described in the Uluru Statement from the Heart. Dean draws on diverse experience, including most recently as an investment analyst at Tanarra Capital. He has worked extensively with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and communities. Dean has consulted across a range of sectors at national, regional, and local levels. He has advised clients on strategy and engagement, and has commercial experience both in Australia and the UK. Dean has a Bachelor of Arts (Politics and Journalism) from the University of Queensland and a Graduate Certificate in Education from the University of Melbourne. He is a Senior Fellow of the Atlantic Fellowship for Social Equity and is an ex-officio member of the Business Council of Australia's Indigenous Engagement Taskforce.

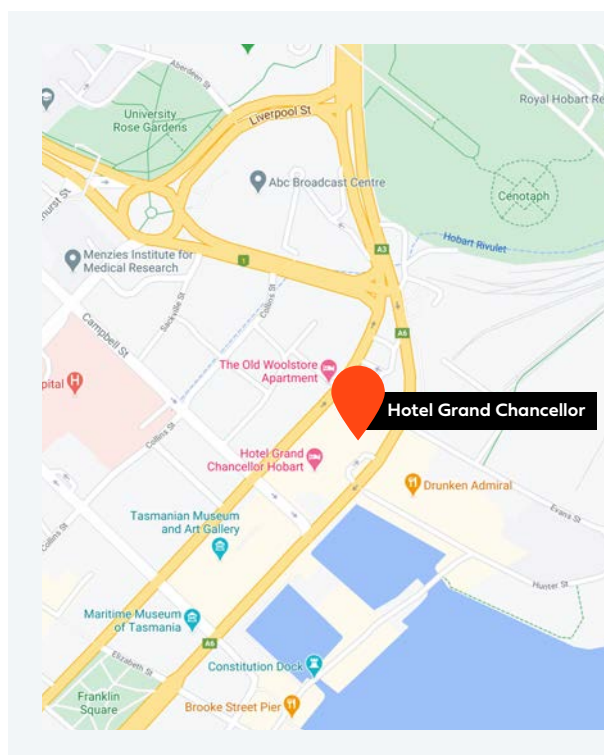
Greg Jemsek*
